

STRENGTHENING INDIANA'S INVESTMENT IN K-12 PUBLIC EDUCATION

Two-year state budget proposal marks record investment, supports educational opportunities for all students

\$763 million in total new money for K-12 versus 2017 state biennial budget

Key points of House Bill 1001

Direct State Support for K-12 Education totaling \$689 million in new money

- Increases state K-12 tuition support by **\$539 million** over the biennium:
 - 2.5% in FY2020 (\$178 million); and
 - 2.5% in FY2021 (\$361 million).
- Increases the school funding formula's basic and categorical grants:
 - Raises the Foundation Grant from \$5,352 to:
 - \$5,548 (3.7%) in FY2020; and
 - \$5,703 (2.8%) in FY2021.
 - Raises the Complexity Adjustment Grant from \$3,539 to:
 - \$3,650 (3.1%) in FY2020; and
 - \$3,675 (0.7%) in FY2021.
 - Provides a complexity bump for schools with high English-Language Learners (ELL) student populations:
 - \$128 in additional funding per student.
 - Raises the Pre-K Special Education Grant from \$2,750 to:
 - \$2,875 (4.5%) in FY2020; and
 - \$3,000 (4.3%) in FY2021.
- Transfers **\$150 million** from State General Fund Reserves to buy down the Post-1996 Teacher Retirement Fund (TRF) Plan, resulting in a 2% reduction in school corporation retirement contributions.
 - An estimated ongoing annual savings of \$70 million, or the equivalent of 1% growth in state tuition support.

Additional \$74 million in new statewide investments for K-12 programs including:

- Increases the Teacher Appreciation Grant (TAG) Program's annual appropriation from \$30 million to \$37.5 million;
- Increases the Non-English Program's annual appropriation from \$17.5 million to \$22.5 million;
- Increases the Secured School Safety Grant Program's annual funding from \$9 million to \$19 million;
- Funds the newly created Teacher & Student Advancement Grant Program (HEA 1008) and the Teacher Residency Grant Pilot Program (HEA 1009);
- Adjusts the Aug. 1 kindergarten start date to Sept. 1, 2019, and then to Oct. 1, 2020;
- Introduces \$3 million in annual funding for computer science teacher training; and
- Urges Legislative Council to study the School Funding Formula's Complexity Index over the 2019 interim.

Next steps:

The House Bill 1001 Conference Committee Report now moves to the House and Senate for final passage on Wednesday before moving to the governor's desk.
